The Ilyushin Beriyev 50, also known as the A-50 Mainstay, is a Soviet/Russian airborne early warning and control aircraft (AEW&C). It is based on the Ilyushin II-76 transport aircraft and is designed to detect and track airborne targets, as well as to direct fighter aircraft to intercept them.

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The A-50 has been in service with the Soviet and Russian Air Forces since 1984, and has been exported to several other countries. It has been used in a variety of conflicts, including the Gulf War, the Yugoslav Wars, and the Syrian Civil War.

#### Development

The A-50 was developed in the early 1980s as a replacement for the Tupolev Tu-126 Moss AWACS aircraft. The Tu-126 was a converted Tu-95 bomber, and was not as capable as the A-50. The A-50 was designed to be

a dedicated AEW&C aircraft, and was equipped with a more powerful radar and a more advanced electronics suite. The A-50 also had a longer range and a higher endurance than the Tu-126.



#### Design

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


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
