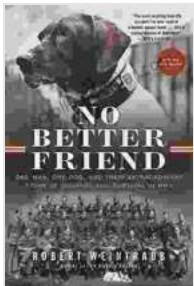

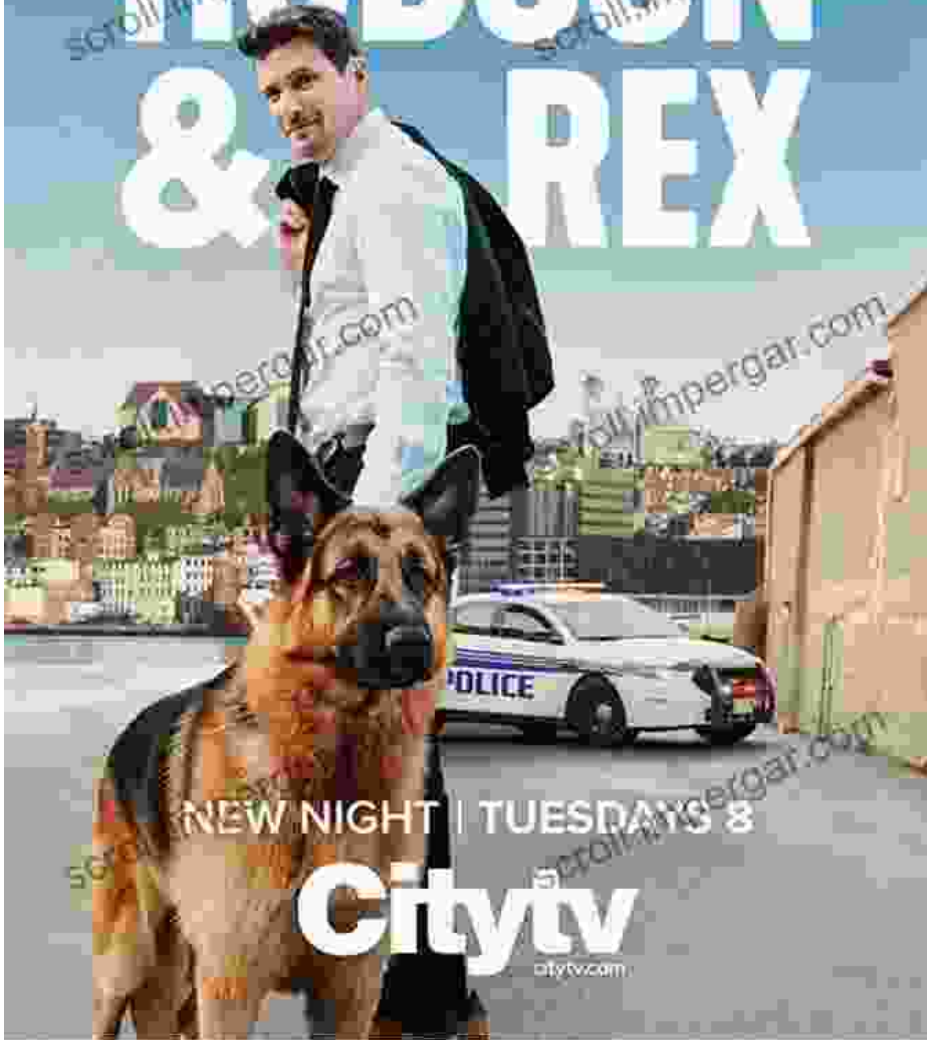

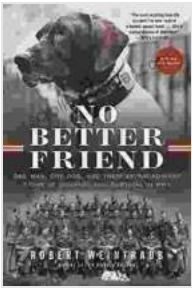


Rex at the POW camp

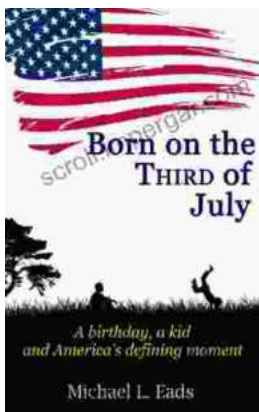
