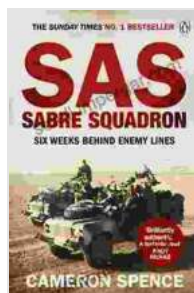

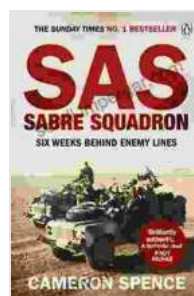
After the war, Spence worked as a civilian pilot and as a businessman. He is the author of several books, including Sabre Squadron and The Tuskegee Airmen.

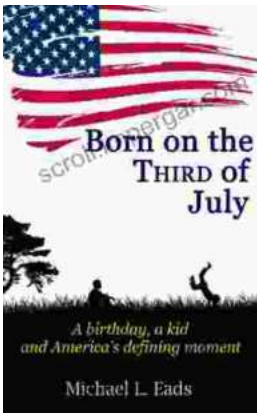
