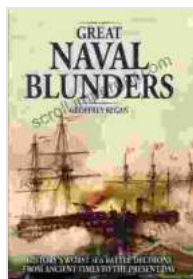


The 10 Worst Sea Battle Decisions From Ancient Times to the Present Day

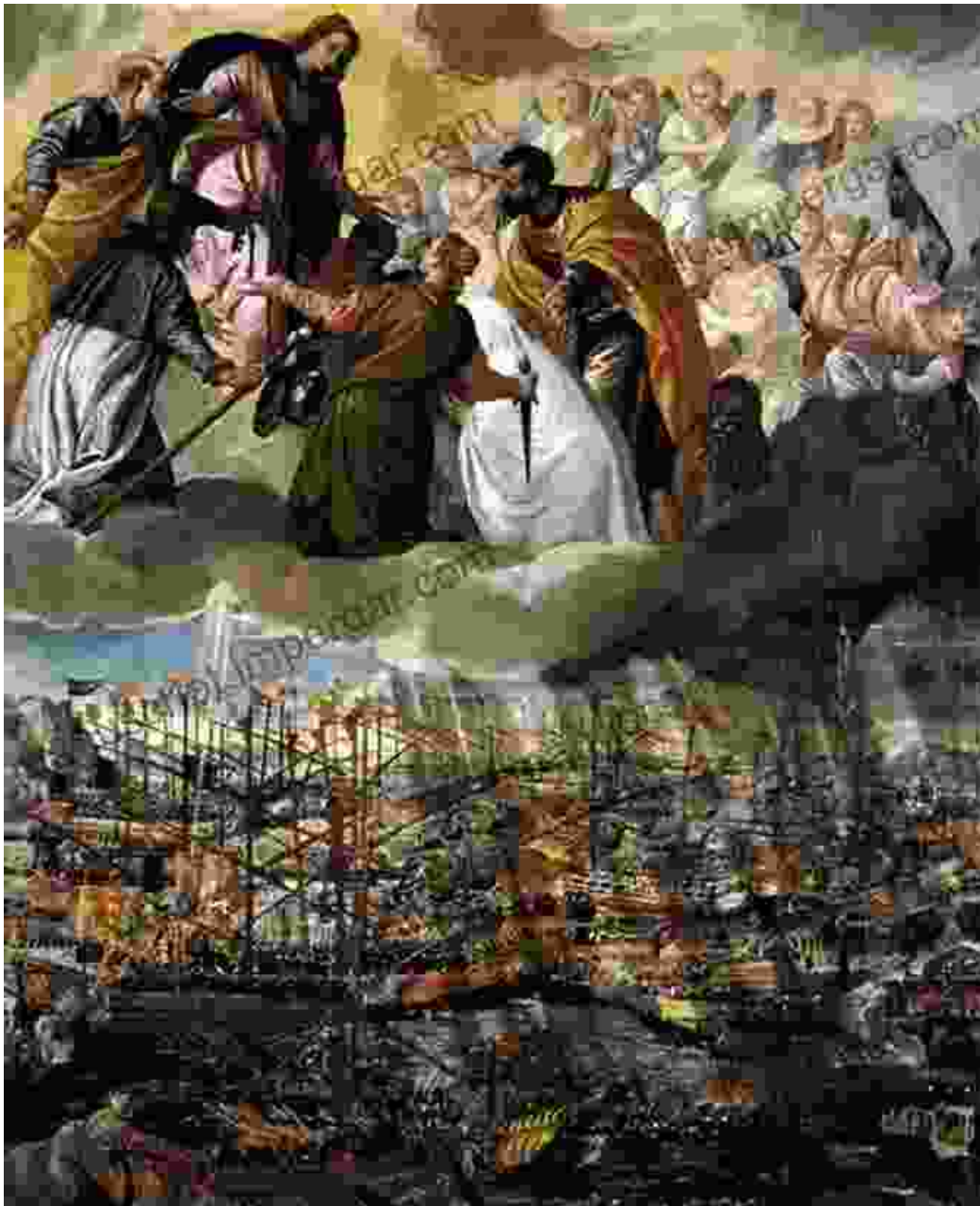
3. The Battle of Agincourt (1415)

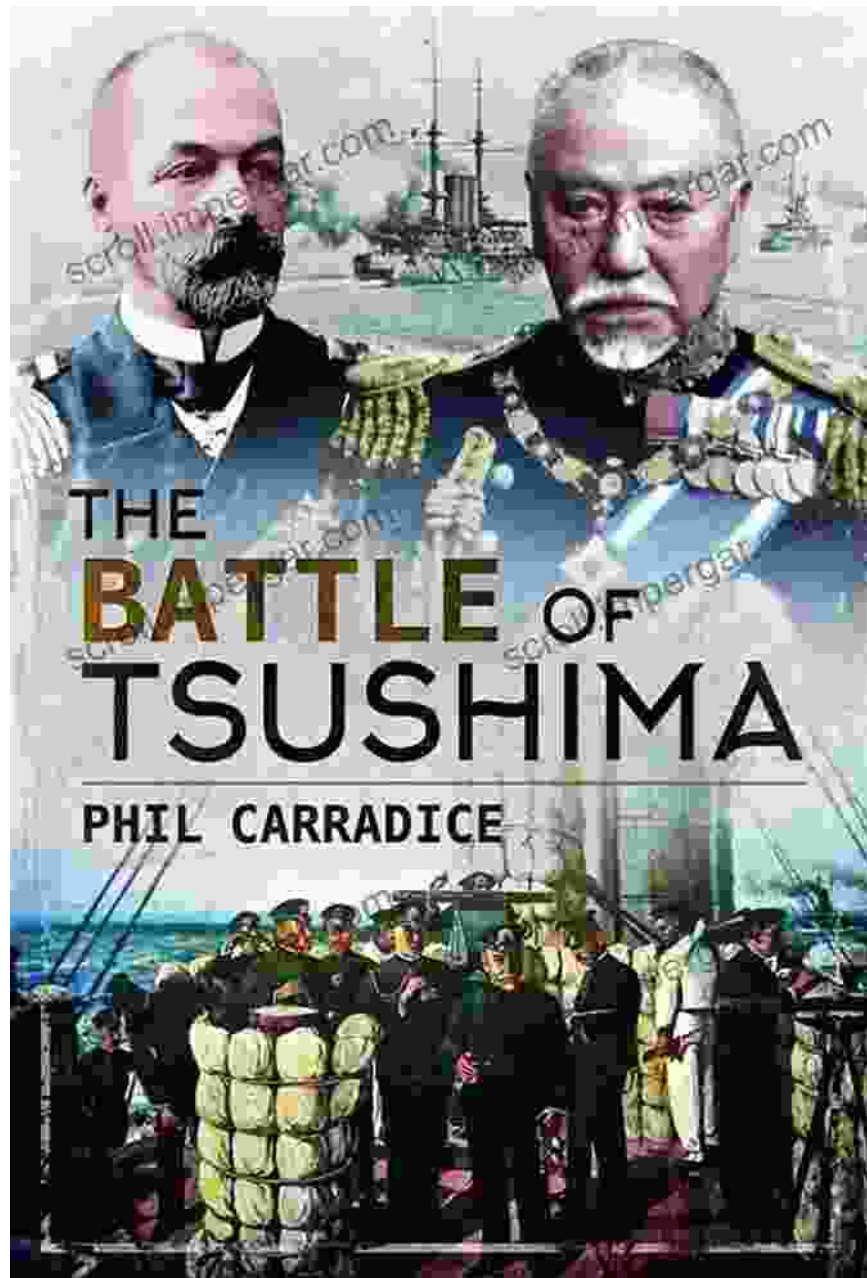
5. The Battle of Trafalgar (1805)

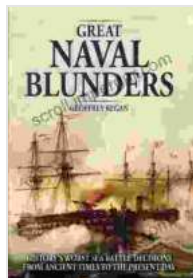
10. The Battle of Leyte Gulf (1944)

reminder that even the best laid plans can go awry, and that even the most experienced commanders can make mistakes.



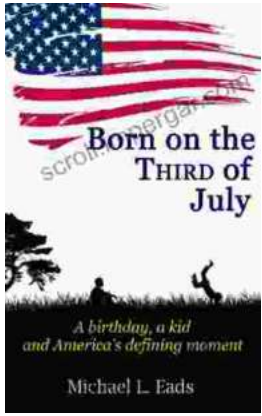
